BLUE CLIMATE SUMMIT

This global convening in French Polynesia brought together 250 ocean and climate advocates from around the globe to advance 20 projects targeting ocean protection and climate change. Participants included scientists, community and cultural leaders, government officials, youth representatives and environmental organizations.



The Summit Co-Conveners included Prince Albert II of Monaco, Richard Bailey, Marc Benioff, Dr. Sylvia Earle, Andrew Forrest, French Polynesia President Edouard Fritch, Laura Turner Seydel and Nainoa Thompson.

Projects ranged from a new blue carbon exchange and an MPA watch to a wave energy incentive competition and a deep sea mining (DSM) moratorium project. Traditional knowledge and youth involvement were a major focus - providing valuable new perspectives and insights.

Special thanks go to the Government of French Polynesia, which provided invaluable support and hosted the opening session at the Presidential Palace, a special welcome ceremony at the sacred site of Taputapuatea, and an Ocean Concert which brought together Summit participants and the public.

OCEAN INNOVATION PRIZE

We raised \$1 million to encourage and support innovations that mitigate climate change through ocean-related strategies. We then conducted a global incentive challenge in collaboration with the United Nations Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development and the Sustainable Ocean Alliance that attracted 235 applicants from 60 countries. In 2022, we had the honor of awarding \$1 million to the most promising programs. The winners were:
